"This volunteer leadership role is a true extension of my life's work — personal and professional — to empower survivors to never give up!"

In honor of the club's commitment to stroke awareness and prevention, the Scott Coppersmith Stroke Foundation is presenting CFSC with the Hero of the Year Award during its 4th annual Gala to be held on **July 13, 2013 at The Westin in Lake Mary**, Florida. Greene will accept the award on behalf of the Central Florida Stroke Club.

For more than 40 years, the Central Florida Stroke Club, in conjunction with the American Stroke Association and area hospitals, has been a safe place where experiences, expertise and understanding about the potentially life-altering disease are shared, while also educating the community about our nation's number four killer, including common misconceptions, such as strokes only strike the elderly population. To the contrary, a stroke can occur to individuals of any age, race or gender. According to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, in 2011, 42,508 Orlando residents and 527,413 Florida residents suffered a stroke.

"'We never realized just how many young stroke survivors there are in our community. Our daughter was only 29 when she suffered a massive stroke (two years ago). Having support for her and our family has been so helpful," stated Diane and Steve Johnston, CFSC members.

Complementary to the clubs efforts to parlay recovery opportunities and information, it is the vision and plan of Greene's non-profit, Bcenter, to build a world-class stroke recovery facility and retreat in Central Florida to serve survivors and caregivers worldwide.
